One place to look is The New American Home 2009, built for the International Builders Show in Las Vegas this year. This multi-million-dollar home showcases an abundance of new concepts that can be adapted to home design and remodeling at all price levels.

We can pick up some incredible ideas just by focusing on one section of the large house: the master suite. This suite is a beautiful, restful oasis located on the main level, but at the opposite side of the house from the public area.

To help keep the bedroom cool in the hot, desert climate, it was given a northern exposure. Taking advantage of the climate and geography when planning rooms in a home can greatly add to energy efficiency. The master suite also benefits from the insulated concrete forms used for the main structural element of the entire home, providing superior thermal performance throughout.

The bedroom is seamlessly integrated with the exterior Zen garden through an 8-foot-wide passage created by motorized telescoping all-glass patio doors. The restful spirit of an outdoor garden can permeate an entire home through expansive openings like this.

In the master closet, sleek Espresso stained wood cabinets with horizontally placed Zebra wood faces reinforce the feeling of serenity. This carefully planned walk-in closet provides organized storage for all the things that typically clutter up a bedroom. Organized storage is one of the most sought-after amenities in today's home.

A well-appointed morning kitchen adjacent to the bedroom provides all the necessary appliances, storage and workspace to conveniently start the day. A mini-kitchen can be tucked into the corner of almost any room to provide a welcome drink or snack.

The master bath is welcoming to all abilities and age groups. The no-threshold shower with integral bench, the floating vanities, and the wide-decked tub demonstrate the application of universal design principles.

Eco-friendly solutions are evident throughout the master suite. Just a few examples: Tankless water heaters provide instant hot water without wasting the energy necessary to keep water hot in a separate tank. Solar electric power is generated from solar panels installed on the roof. LED fixtures were chosen for the recessed lights in the ceiling. The soft carpet underfoot is made from SmartStrand, a new fiber that is made in part from renewable crops.

This house is an amazing garden of ideas. Take good notes and have fun tossing around some of these exciting new concepts. Picture how they could be transplanted into your own house to help make it the place you're glad to come home to. ■

Smart Carpet

Even the carpet is green in the eco-savvy New American Home 2009. The SmartStrand carpet by Mohawk is made from Dupont Sorona fibers. Since these fibers are created in part from renewable crops like field corn, the carpet helps conserve our limited petroleum resources. But that's not its only selling point. It also has permanent stain-resistance engineered into the fibers, so there is no need to re-treat the carpet with stain protectors after steam cleaning. In wear tests it has also proven to be exceptionally durable. ■

Good Vibes

Kohler takes relaxation to a new level in The New American Home with their VibeAcoustic bathtub. Transducers are located on the backside of the bath below the water for a music vibration experience and two above the water for audio. Four preset VibeAcoustic experiences synchronize music, vibration and light with water. A Fusion of Color Trends

“Color dichotomy” describes the color forecast for 2009-2010 for residential and commercial interiors from the Color Association of the United States (CAUS), a forecast of color trends used by manufacturers of environmental and interior products. The palette exhibits both contrast and contradiction, reflecting uncertain and chaotic circumstances as we approach a new decade of the 21st century.

Urban Neutrals

Urban neutrals are the core:

- No-colors – a bit off kilter and moody, such as sepias, taupes, tobaccos, bronzes and off-browns;
- Whites – speak of purity, luxury, the ethereal and a new start; it acts as a stage set for beautiful color combos.
- Gray – Definitely the new leading family. We see “techie” grays alongside of elegant taupes, metallic silvers and graphites.

Graphic Brights

These vibrant, energetic colors are represented with new neons, acid and fluorescent brights, electric primaries, and the bold contrast of black and white. The graphic brights punch up the urban neutrals and the black and white story.

Eco-colors

Driving influences on color and design are sustainability and ecological concerns. These colors are familiar and comforting

and include pre-washed hues, organic dyes and tender colorations inspired by nature.

- Cheerful, sunlit golds and yellows;
- New botanical greens as fresh grasses and new leaves, celadons, clean tropicals and jades;
- Reds are important – from terracottas and pinks to crimson;
- Orange becomes coral, copper and cantaloupe;
- We will have blue in all its glory: sky blue, periwinkle, cobalt, cornflower, royal, nautical, lavender blue and a plethora of spa-influenced blues. Purpled blues and blueed-greens shift into a new range of teals and aquas. The blue palette will play off of the urban neutrals and metallic segments of the palette.

Luster and Shimmer

Sparkle and shine has resurfaced with a vengeance as glitz, dazzle and shimmer. Luster adds life to deep shades. This contemporary fantasy embraces glamour in all forms and applauds over-the-top drama in design. Metallics are a major influence in reflective color. Tarnished, burnished, polished or brushed, they add to the neutral palette. Choose from an array of silvers, coppers, bronzes or precious metals.

Finally, there will be an emphasis on imagination, fostering a mix of unusual color combinations. ■

Vanity Fair

Homeowners around the country are taking a departure from the traditional box cabinets for their bathroom vanities and selecting a furniture look instead. They are searching for ways to personalize their bathrooms and make them more interesting.

Many people make use of antique furniture pieces in their bathrooms. A traditional sideboard can be transformed into a stunning double bowl vanity, for example. The fluted spindle legs and the intricate wood inlay on the cabinet fronts would make this vanity a real conversation piece.

This kind of retrofit is not without its challenges, however. The sideboard would need to be rebuilt to accept the sinks, fixtures and plumbing. The drawers would all have to be modified if they were going to be functional. The wood finish may cause problems later, since it wasn't designed to withstand continual moisture. That can be true of the hardware finishes as well.

A better option would be to select one of the many new furniture-style vanities now on the market. The wood is properly sealed, the pieces are designed with ventilation, and they are sized to fit standard US plumbing configurations. The hardware is specifically manufactured for bathroom use. Towel bars, shelves and drawers are conveniently placed and organized to fit toiletry items. These vanities are available in a variety of heights so you can order the one that best fits your stature. Separate his-and-her vanities give you the luxury of choosing two different heights if you wish.

The styling of the vanities ranges from traditional to contemporary, from Arts & Crafts to rustic. Following the trend in furniture casegoods, the current emphasis is on a sleek profile with minimal decorative elements. Cherry and maple wood in glazed, rubbed, and distressed finishes are popular selections. Some units come without tops so you can also choose your preferred material. Granite and marble are the leading choices, but wood, glass and even concrete are elegant alternatives. Decorative mirrors are often designed to complement the vanity and finish off the designer look. ■
